

# Journey of a Life-Giver

# **Level 1 Workshop**

### **Workshop Hours**

In person - 32 hours of training time (usually divided over 4 or 5 days)

### Prerequisite

This training is designed for gospel leaders with influence over multiple church leaders. Participants of this event may or may not have attended the *Advanced Prayer Initiative* which will have taken place a approximately 30 days prior to this training.

## **Workshop Description**

The *Journey of a Life-Giver* workshop will offer a life-changing, sanctity of human life experience that focuses on prominent issues faced by Christians, as it prepares them to share the message of life. In a series of valuable and motivating sessions, participants will learn about the biblical foundation for the value and dignity of human life and will gain useful insights into how to speak to their families, congregations, and communities about issues related to the sacredness of human life.

## **Workshop Objectives**

The major objectives of the workshop are:

- √ To experience personal transformation inspired by God's Spirit,
- ✓ To be equipped and have the authority to replicate this same training in their own places
  of ministry, and
- ✓ To discern God's call to take action in response to the devaluing of human life where they are called to serve.

#### **Workshop Requirements**

The characteristics of a participant should include:

- Influence over multiple church leaders
- Aptitude for envisioning others through teaching
- Experience and reliability as a trainer of trainers
- Passion for the biblical sanctity of human life message

#### Attendance

- The size of the group should be limited to 35-50 participants for dialogue to be effective.
- Both men and women will be trained. The expectation is that 1/3 1/2 of the participants are women.
- Participants must be committed to attend the full training, which means they will attend every session (32 hours)



### Venue

- There must be two rooms/space to separate men and women during some sessions.
- There must be space to divide into small groups during activities.
- An informal setting is best to encourage participant interaction.
- A venue similar to one the participants themselves would use is preferred.
